

## Critique Of Judgment Immanuel Kant

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The Critique of Judgment, also translated as the Critique of the Power of Judgment, is a 1790 book by the German philosopher Immanuel Kant. Sometimes referred to as the "third critique," the Critique of Judgment follows the Critique of Pure Reason and the Critique of Practical Reason.

In broad outline, Kant sets about examining our faculty of judgment, which leads him down a number of divergent paths. While the Critique of Judgment deals with matters related to science and teleology, it is most remembered for what Kant has to say about aesthetics.

Kant's interest in aesthetics clearly persisted throughout much of his career, reaching its height, as we know, in the Critique of Judgment. Although the Critique of Judgment advances a very sophisticated aesthetic theory that

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Kant had not developed when he wrote the Observations, he retains the view that aesthetics is largely a matter of addressing the finer pleasures of beauty and sublimity.

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In THE CRITIQUE OF JUDGMENT (1790), Immanuel Kant (1724-1804) seeks to establish the a priori principles underlying the faculty of judgement, just as he did in his previous critiques of pure and practical reason.

The Critique of Judgment was the third and last of Kant's three Critiques, the other two being the Critique of Pure Reason (1781, with a second edition in 1787), which deals with metaphysics and epistemology, and the Critique of Practical Reason of 1788, which, alongside his Groundwork of the Metaphysics of Morals of 1785, deals with ethics.
